Alice's story...

When Alice was born two months prematurely, an early scan showed no signs of brain damage. But at her six-week check-up her parents, Jenny and Matthew, were given devastating news. Alice had cystic masses on her brain, a sign of severe and irreversible damage.

Alice was diagnosed with a condition called periventricular leukomalacia. Cerebral palsy is the most common symptom and sadly Alice's body, arms and legs are severely affected. Cerebral palsy is the most common serious physical disability in children, affecting around 2,000 babies born in the UK every year. The specific cause is often unknown but babies born prematurely, or with a low birth weight, are known to be at increased risk.

"Alice is a bright and happy child but she gets so frustrated because she cannot walk, crawl or even sit up without help," says Jenny. "Anything that gives us more ways to help our children is really important."

Action is funding a number of different research teams, all developing treatments and therapies to give children with cerebral palsy the best possible quality of life. These include a team developing a wrist-worn device and smartphone app to help children with hemiplegic cerebral palsy, affecting one side of the body. This aims to improve strength and movement in their affected hand and arm.

> Another team is conducting a UK-wide study to ensure children with bilateral cerebral palsy, affecting both legs, receive the best possible treatment to correct muscle and bone deformities and help them walk.

Supporting premature children at school

We're delighted to have funded the development of new resources for teachers, to help them better understand and support children who were born too soon.

Children born early are at higher risk of experiencing learning difficulties or special educational needs as they grow up. But research had shown that many teachers are not aware of the issues these particular pupils may face – even though, on average, a typical school class is likely to have two or three children who were born too soon.

With Action funding Professor Samantha Johnson and colleagues from five universities have developed an interactive e-learning resource. It explains the impact preterm birth can have on a child's development and learning, and includes practical strategies that teachers can use to support them.

Preventing infections in critically ill children

Children in intensive care often receive life-saving antibiotics but heavy use of these medicines is a growing concern. With Action funding, researchers are studying a new infection control treatment.

Most critically ill children will be given antibiotics to treat suspected infections that are either a cause or complication of their illness, and this undoubtedly saves lives. But high exposure to these drugs can also increase the risk of developing antibiotic-resistant infections. This can have very serious consequences. A new preventative treatment could reduce the need for strong antibiotics in these very vulnerable young patients.

Dr Nazima Pathan is leading a pilot study involving children in six intensive care units across the UK. This research is comparing standard treatment with a new infection control treatment, called selective decontamination of the digestive tract. This already appears to benefit adults, reducing infections and improving survival.

Most infections that occur when a child is receiving intensive care arise from bacteria growing in the gut. The new treatment uses non-absorbable antibiotics to stop this.

"Some critically ill children have long-term or complex health problems and infection by antibiotic-resistant bacteria could make them much sicker and reduce their chances of survival," says Dr Nazima Pathan.

Pedalling to Paris – Alex and Ashley's story

Twins Alex and Ashley took on our London to Paris cycle challenge, riding in memory of their mum, Jayne, who sadly died shortly after their early birth.

Jayne had developed pre-eclampsia during her pregnancy and, when her condition dangerously deteriorated, the girls had to be delivered under controlled conditions. They were born weighing just 2lb and spent several months in hospital.

"Pregnancy complications and premature births happen daily and it breaks our hearts – the thought of others having to go through such a difficult time," says Ashley. "The expert care we received as babies might not have been possible without the help of charities like Action"



First-time mum turned fundraiser – Lucy's story

Lucy shared her story with us when the campaign launched. Baby Luka arrived suddenly, 10 weeks too soon, in May last year. With his traumatic start thankfully behind them, Lucy's thoughts turned to helping others. She's been playing our weekly lottery and as a social media champion has encouraged friends and family to support us via Facebook and Instagram. Luka's helped too as the face of our recent NEC appeal! And as this magazine went to press, Lucy was about to hold her first fundraising event.

Running for tiny lives – Marcya's story

Driven by the loss of one of her tiny granddaughters, Marcya took on the challenge of running the Vitality London 10,000, with support from son Keith. Together they raised more than £500.

"I would climb a mountain today to bring Paige back. I can't do that, but I can help raise funds for Action"

Twins Isla and Paige were born at just 26 weeks. "The girls were perfect – tiny and fragile – but beautiful," says Marcya. "For four weeks they went from strength to strength. Then Paige became ill. She developed necrotising enterocolitis (NEC), a truly devastating illness, and despite an operation and a battle for life she died in her mummy and daddy's arms."
